
AVDCFB-C SUBJECT: Combat Operations After Action Report (Operation YELLOWSTONE)

Artillery Regt, let Guard Bn; 680th Training Regt, 7th NVA Div, 82d Rear Services Group, and possible elements of the 9th NVA Div. The total strength of these units was estimated between 10,000 and 14,000; however, in late November 1967, the 9th VC Div moved into Northwestern Binh Long Province and other units were dispersed down to battalion-size units throughout War Zone "C". Initially their pattern of activity was to defend supply areas and to fight delay actions, allowing COSVN He to move north across the Cambodian Border. Once this was accomplished, enemy forces conducted counter sweep operations and attacks on friendly base camps.

- b. War Zone "C" is characterized by extremely heavy jungle vegetation and occasional open areas. The hydrography of the area is restricted to two small streams which had little effect on friendly or enemy movement. The terain was heavily dotted with trunches and fortifications. The largest concentrations appeared to be in headquarters and cache areas just south of the Cambodian Border.
- c. In the first week of the Operation, friendly units met with little enemy resistance. Most of the contact was limited to indirect fire harrassment and probing actions. Intelligence indicated that COSVN HQ and its security guard units were located due north of KATUM, probably moving across the border. Other unit dispositions and locations were unknown; however, it was suspected that elements of the NVA 7th Div were dispersed to the south and east of KATUM. There were no signs of a mass exodum of War Zone "C", upon the arrival of US troops.
- d. Significant contacts during the operation were generally with company or smaller sized units defending base camps. There were a few instances of enemy units attacking ARVN or FWF during sweeps, but the majority of activity involved contact with VC/NVA units in heavily fortified base camps or forward defensive positions. Enemy tactics were to make the operation as costly as possible while committing a minimum number of troops. He made extensive use of indirect fire, employing 60mm, 82mm, and 120mm mortage, and 122mm rockets. These attacks were generally used for herrassing purposes, attempting to inflict casualties and destroy supplies rather than to support ground attacks. However the enemy did on two occasions demonstrate a capebility to conduct a multi-bettalion attack on friendly FSBs.
- e. The enemy employed AT mines on Route 4, but AP mines and booby trape were conspicuous by their absence.
 - f. Significent many losses:
- (1) 09 and 09 Dec 671 4-9 Inf Bn vic XT 299 938 located three eaches containing 350 tone of unpolished rice. The rice was later evacuated.

- (2) 200140-200500 Dec 67. The 4-9 Inf Bn PSB BEAUREGUARD (IT 380 855) was attacked by an estimated 1-2 NVA battaltons from the 141st NVA Regt. Results: 6 UB KIA, 12 US WIA; 40 VC KIA (BC), 35 KIA (POSS), 18 small arms, 9 crew-served weapons, and 1 PRC-10 radio captured.
- ()) 041030 Jan 68. B Co 2-14 Inf located and destroyed 40 tons of polished rice vic IT 358 858.
- (4) 171428-171700 Jan 68. 2-14 Inf engaged an estimated 2 VC companies vic IT 348 906. Results: 2 US KIA, 13 US WIA; 13 VC KIA (BC), 1 small arm and 5 heavy weapons captured.
- (5) 251415-251620 Jan 68. 2-14 Inf ungaged an estimated VC company vic XT 248 352. Results: 1 US KIA, 16 US WIA; 20 VC KIA (BC).
- (6) 051513 Feb 68. A Co 4-9 Inf ambushed a VC squad vic IT 362 870 resulting in 7 VC KIA (BC), 2 pounds of documents, and 1 mechine gum.
- (7) 070015 Feb 68. 1st Brigade CRIP ambushed an estimated VC company, vic IT 186 504. Resulte: 1 US WIA, 2 PF WIA; 26 VC KIA (BC).
- (8) 161245-170900 Feb 68. 2-14 Inf engaged one VC bettalion vic IT 242 483 entrenched in Tay Ninh City. Results: 4 US KIA, 25 US WIA; 81 VC KIA (BC).
- (9) 19 Feb. 2-14 Inf engaged an estimated VC company with all organic weapons and surporting fires vio XT 0754. Results: 3 US WIA; 66 VC KIA (BC), 2 VC ROW, 81 rounds 107mm rockets, and 114 rounds 82mm mortar.
- g. The heavy jungle in Wer Zone "C" made movement slow and tiring. Streams were for the most part an insignificant factor in effecting movement. The ground was hard, but the jungle restricted movement of tracked vehicles to the road.
- h. Observation and fields of fire were extremely limited by the dense vegetation. The VC overcame this by making extensive use of observers in trees. In this memoer the VC were able to securately adjust mortar fire on the FSBs.
- i. The everall evaluation of the intelligence information gained from local and attached sources was considered to be C-3 (sometimes reliable, possibly true). In Mar Zone "C" there was a lack of local agents. Nest intelligence was from the combat troops and serial detection devices. Operational security of Operation TELLOWSTONE was considered fair.

- 9. (C) Mission: The 1st Brigade received the mission to locate and destroy VC/NVA forces and installations in War Zone "C" and to complete the following engineer projects:
- (vic XT 0881).
- b. Construct USSF/CIDG comp and rehabilitate airfield to type II C-
- c. Clear, improve and maintain the following roads for military con-
 - (1) Route 4 (XT 284 618 to XT 333 903)
 - (2) Route 243 (XT 284 619 to XT 335 575)
 - (3) Route 247 (XT 101 758 to XT 272 772)
- 10. (C) Concept of the operation: The 1st Brigade conducted combat operations with the 4-9 Inf, 2-14 Inf, and the TF 2-34 Armor constituting the major force. Combat operations were designed to support the engineer effort at KATUM and PREK KLOK, THEIN NGON, and secure logistical convoys to KATUM, and to search out and destroy VC/NVA forces and bases. This operation was conducted in three phases.
- s. Phase I. (D-Day to D+10) The 4-9 Inf, 2-14 Inf, 7-11 Artillery and the 588th Engineer battalion were sirlifted into the CIDG secured LZ at KATUM, and conducted combat assault vic KATUM with the 4-9 Inf and 2-14 Inf. TF 2-34 Armor secured movement of the heavy engineer equipment to KATUM, artillery to PREK KLOK, and logistical convoys on Route 4 from MUI BA DAN to KATUM, and began improving the KATUM sirstrip to receive C-130 sircraft.
- b. Phase II (D+10 to D+60) The let Brigade conducted methodical search and destroy operations within the TAOR, opened Route 4 for overland resupply to PREK KLOK and KATUM.
- c. Phase III (After D+60) YELLOWSTONE forces began phasing down. 2-14 Inf and HHC lat Brigade returned to TAY NINH BASE CAMP 8 Feb 68 with the remaining elements closing TAY NINH 23 Feb 68.
- 11. (C) Execution: let Brigade received the 25th Infantry Division OPLAN
 18-67 (Operation YELLOWETCHE) dated 281900H Nov 67. The 1st Brigade prepared
 and implemented OFCHD 12-67 (Operation YELLOWSTONE) dated 031200H Dec 67. In
 executing D-Day of Operation YELLOWSTONE each battalion of the Brigade Task



Force prepared their OPORD. The 2-14 Inf the the 4-9 Inf conducted a combat assault into L2's in the vicinity of KATUM securing objectives designed to provide security to the Task Force elements to be quartered at KATUM. The 588th Engr Bn from D-20 to D-1 cleared and opened roads required to support Operation IELLOWSTONE, and on D-Day convoyed to KATUM. On D-Day the 7-11 Artillery Bn was sirlifted from TAY NINH to KATUM (FSB CUSTER). TF 2-34 Armor from D-2 to D-1 occupied FSB ELISS (XT 287 642) and FSB HILL (XT 278 680) while on D-Day the TF 2-34 Armor attacked north to establish a FSB at PREX KLOK (XT 288 815).

b. Significant contacts

- (1) 11 Dec 67: 4-9 Inf in an ambush patrol vic XT 275 960 engaged 2 VC with small arms at 0135H. At 0218H this AP received 50 rounds of 60mm mortar resulting in 1 KIA and 8 WIA. The mortar fire lasted 21 minutes. The AP requested a LPT, counter-mortar ship, and a Spooky. Artillery fire was provided from FSB CUSTER (XT 333 903). At 6311H mortar fire began again with 10 rounds of 60mm from vic XT 268 975. At 0316H, 14 rounds of 60mm and 1 RPG were received from vic XT 265 966. Losses: 2 KIA and 22 WIA. VC losses unknown. NOTE: By engaging the 2 VC with unknown results the 4-9 Inf compromised their position but did not relocate.
- (2) 120845 Dec 67: While the 1-49 ARVN Inf was combat assaulting to an LZ vic XT 378 858, one of the UHIHs carrying troops was shot down vic XT 334 915. The LZ was initially cold at 0836H, but as the third lift to 1-49 Inf landed on the LZ at 0901H, they received 60mm mortar fire, indicating the LZ was hot. The mortar was spotted at XT 390 857 and engaged with a gunship and artillery. Mortar contact was broken at 0937H. The LZ remained cold after 0937H.
- (3) 121130 Dec. The CO HHC, let Brigade CAC ship received small arms fire from vic XT 343 913. Artillery was fired into the ares. At 1130H also a CH-47 extracting a UH-1D from XT 342 913 received fire from XT 342 913. At 1304H PAC received fire from XT 342 913 resulting in no hits. At 1425H, B Company 2-14 Inf received small arms fire from XT 342 913, returning fire with artillery and organic weapons. At 150SH B company 2-14 Inf received additional fire from XT 342 913 again returning fire with artillery. At 1514H PAC received BAR fire from XT 342 913 and again artillery fire was delivered into the area. Lesses: no friendly; enemy unknown. NOTE: Artillery does not negate the necessity for the infantry to move through an area to clear the area of VC.
- (4) 140827 Dec b7: A Company 2-14 Inf received 3A and AW fire from vic IT 343 912 from an estimated 2 VC. Contact was broken at 0829H with no casualties. Contact was reestablished at 0844H resulting in 1 KIA and 1 WIA. Contact was broken at 0910H and reestablished at 1035H with A Co receiv-

ing SA and AN fire and rifle granades resulting in 2 WIA. Contact broken at 1038H and reestablished at 1056H from a bunker vic XT 343 913 with A Co receiving AW fire and RPG from an estimated 20 VC 90mm fire was delivered point blank on the bunker and an airstrike delivered at IT 343 912. The airstrike resulted in 2 US WIA from A Co and one WIA from C Co who had maneuvered into the area to assist A company. At 1540H A company continued to sweep to IT 338 909 while C Company sweep to IT 342 914 without contact. Friendly losses: 2 KIA, 15 WIA; enemy losses: 2 VC (BC).

- (5) 140940 Dec: C Company 4-9 Inf received SA fire and claymore from vic IT 245 941 with sporadic fire continuing until 0950H. B Company moved in to block the trails vic IT 241 937. Contact was maintained until about 1100H. An airstrike was delivered at 1105H to XT 250 940. B Company moved to the north flank as the contact was reestablished at 1115H. Contact at 1120H was vic IT 245 944, with this contact broken at 1147H. Friendly losses: 6KIA, 18 WIA; enemy losses: 7 KIA (BC), 10 KIA (PCSS), and 3 RFG 2 rounds.
- (6) 150640 Dec. MATUM Base Camp received 35-40 60mm morter rounds. At first light when C Capany 2-14 Inf examined the perimeter they found that one claymore mine had had the wires cut and one claymore had been turned around.
- estimated VC platoon vic XT 245 942. The VC platoen had 7 AW firing. D Company began moving from XT 241 944 at 1035H to assist B Company. VC contact with B Company was broken at 1059H and reestablished at 1103H as 3 AW began firing from XT 245 942, resulting in 1 US WIA. CSRCA was placed on the VC position at 1116H. Contact was broken at 1145H with B Company moving to XT 245 939. D Company established contact vic XT 246 944 at 1214H and breaking off at 1230H without casualties.
- (8) 200140 Dec: The 4-9 Inf at FSB HEAUREGARD (IT 380 855) received 95 rounds 82mm and 60mm morter. At 0230H infiltrators were reported inside the perimeter. The infiltrator set fire to the artillery ammunition resulting in 620 rounds 105mm burning. At 0346H the FSB was surrounded by an estimated 1-2 NVA battaliam. At 0405H the land line communications with the PSB were cut. The morter attack ceased at 0550H then began again at 0705H. Contact was broken at 0735H. Friendly losses: 6 KIA, 12 WIA; enemy losses: 40 KIA (NC), 33 KIA (POSS).
- (9) 171428 Jan 68, C company 2-14 Inf established contact vic XT 348 903 with an estimated 2 VC companies. The contact began with C Company receiving SA, and AW, from an estimated 3-10 VC. Fire was returned with SA, AW, artillery, and gunships. From this contact, C Company sustained 1 WIA. Contact remained until at 1515H A Company, who was maneuvering into

the area, recedered fire at vic X 545.000 kessulting in 1 WIA. Contact remained as C Company reported 2 JA and 10 WIA at 1535H. At 1705H the VC force was estimated to have a reinforced platoon in ine woods with 2 platoons in bunkers. Contact was broken as 1730H with sporadic fire remaining until about 1830H. Friendly losses: 2 KIA, 13 WIA; enemy losses: 13 KIA (BC), 14 KIA (POSS).

- (10) 251402 Jan 68. B Company 2-14 Inf received SA fire at XT 248 952 from an estimated reinforced VC squad. The gunshipe on station supported B Company with fire. At 1430H the FAC ship on station received 2 hits with negligible damage. At 1430H A Company received SA fire at XT 248 953 which resulted in the CO of A Company being wounded. At 1443H A and C Companies consolidated under the command of CO C Company. B Company moved into the area and at 1535H B company was at XT 248 952 and A and C Companies at XT 248 954 with the VC force between the 2-14 Inf elements. Contact remained until 1715H. Friendly losses: 1 KIA, 16 WIA; enemy losses: 20 KIA (BC).
- (11) 06 Feb 68. NVA/VC forces employed CS RCA at PREX KLOK. The CS was in burlap bags, tied with rope and wire, and had an explosive charge attached to the outside of the bag. About 6 bags were placed adjacent to the perimeter. Three bags did not detonate. These bags were evacuated to Division. The bags which did detonate were placed downwind from PREX KLOX and were not effective against the camp.
- (12) 11 Feb 68. KATUH Rase Camp received 32 rounds of 82mm morter. Some of the rounds contained "ges" which incapacitated 10 individuals. The casualties were reported to be nauseous and have headaches at 1002H. By 1330H all of these casualties had been returned to duty.
- (13) 150825 Feb 68: A Company 588th Engr Bn and 1 platoon of A Company 2-22 Inf (N) enroute to THIEN NGON were ambushed by an estimated VC company at IT 089 790. The VC fired AW and RFG resulting in 10 KIA, and 2 APC destroyed. The contact was broken at 0850H with unknown VC losses.
- morter and 122mm rocket fire and ground attack. MACV requested and got a APC ARVN troop and 2 ARVN Inf companies to support MACV. Action broke at C245M so is began at RIM KED, IT 231 435. At C310M the morter fire began again at THU KOUNG and RIM KED, but the ground attack had coased. At C345M, as both contacts continued, PHU KOUNG reported VC had entered the MACV compound. One VC POW, captured by MACV, stated that his unit was from NUI BA DEN and that the unit would continue the attack until after sunrise, then would return to NUI BA DEN. Contact was broken at PHU KOUNG at 053CH but continued at MIEN KED. At 0545H the VC GP was suspected to be located vis IT 245 485; and the TAY HINH Province Chief requested US forces to sweep the

area XT 250 493 to XT 250 495 to XT 270 493 to XT 270 470 giving clearance to fire any type ordnance the US forces required. By 1200H 2-14 Inf was sweeping the area vic XT 27 49 and XT 28 50. The combined forces at this time was 4 US companies and ARVN companies. Contact was established at 1245H and continued vic XT 241 48, at 1905h and B and C Companies 2-14 Inf moved to support A Company 2-22 Inf (M). At 1959H three airstrikes were delivered at XT 244 i86. Sporadic contact and mortar fire con inued to 170425 Feb. At 170806 Feb it was reported that the VC unit had withdrawn at 170300 Feb. Contact was not recatablished. Friendly losses: 4 KIA, 25 WIA; enemy losses: 81 KIA (BC). The VC force was estimated at 1 battalion.

(16) 190800 Feb 68. 2-14 Inf established contact with an estimated VC company firing all organic weapons and supporting fires vic XT 075 534. Sporadic contact was maintained all day. Friendly losses: 3 WIA; enemy losses: 66 KIA (BC), and 2 POW.

13. (C) Administrative Matters:

- a. PX facilities were not available to the troops in the field on this operation. A mobile PX was considered but deemed not acceptable in that this would automatically result in the discontinuance of sundry pecks. Any desired items not included in these packs could be purchased by designated unit individuals at Tay Ninh and sent out on resupply. This is preferable to the certain inequities that would occur if a mobile PX was available at the forward base camp.
- b. There was considerable difficulty in the rapid distribution of mail in the early and intermediate stages of the operation. This was largely due to the irregular air service. A regularly scheduled cargo plane eliminated this problem.
- c. Difficulties were also experienced in getting replacements, returning R&R personnel, etc.: from Cu Chi to Tay Ninh and Katum. Again this was largely due not only to irregular serial service but also insufficient flights. Getting soldiers back to their units was always slow. The problem would have been at incalculable proportions if it were not for the frequent ground convoys.
- d. Supply: All classes of supply were drawn from Tay Ninh ISA who operated a forward support area at Katum. Supply convoys were operated daily and controlled by DISCOM Forward. Water points were operated at Katum, Prek Kloc, and Bau CO by the 588th Engineer Boundary Brown Research Research Research

potable water was supplied by a water point operated by the 65th Engineers.

Showers points at Katum were operated by Tay Ninh LSA and at Bau CO by 588th
Engineers. The restest problem area of supply was ice, which seemed to be

- e. Haintenance: Maintenance teams from the battalions were with their respective units. They were able to perform all 2nd echelon vehicular maintenance. The 725th Maintenance Battalion provided some maintenance facilities. No 3rd echelon maintenance was provided in the field. Problem areas for the 2/34 Armor were:
 - (1) Procurement of tank engines
 - (2) Availability of repair parts for M73 machine gun
- (3) Support maintenance for fire control instruments, artillery and artillery and small arms.
- f. Treatment of casualties, evacuation, and hospitalization: Dust-Off support was provided by Cu Chi and Tay Ninh MEDEVAC units. Battalion aid stations treated patients for minor ailments and "D" CO, 25th Medical Clearing Station located at Katum handled all cases beyond the capabilities of the battalion stations.
- g. Transportation: Transportation was provided by organic vehicles, CH-47, C-130, C-123, UHID.
- h. Communications: Communications were provided by brigade and battalion sections; this consisted of FM and RTT. UHF was provided by 125th Signal Battalion.
- Medical Evaluation: Personal health was generally good throughout the operation. One significant problem area, was that of rat control. Control measures included:
 - (1) Proper police of area, especially the mess area.
 - (2) Use of anti-congulant poison.
 - (3) Use of traps and snares.
- (4) Department Maleria Prophelaxyles was used in addition to the Chlorequins-Primacuin tablets. No maleria was reported during the operation. Common complaints included colds, minor cuts and scratches, and at first, sunburn. Skin irritations were a persistant problems with most resulting from the heat. These were minimized by the daily use of showaring facilities.

- a. All engineer projects assigned to the 1st Brigade were completed (USSF/CIDG camps at KATUM and THEIN NGON and improving the airstrip at KATUM to receive C-130 aircraft and constructing an airstrip at THEIN NGON to receive C-123 aircraft).
- b. The roads were secured, cleared, and improved to support the Brigade operations within War Zone "C" and the Brigade located and destroyed many VC/NVA bases and forces. At about D+30 there was a substantial decrease in VC contact as the VC moved into the Saigon area for their TET offensive.
- c. From 18 Jan 68 to 15 Feb 68 all contact with the VC was with very small units or scattered individuals. During this time minor mortar attacks were the only VC offensive actions. Major contact was established on 15, 16, and 17 Feb 68 which suggested that some of the units which had moved to the Saigon area had returned. On 19 Feb 68, the 2-14 Inf located a VC company area which was suspected to have conducted the mortar attacks on the TAY NINH Base Camp.
- d. Action continued throughout the Operation YELLOWSTONE with sporadic contact almost daily.
- e. The use of airmobile assets enabled the Brigade to assault a large portion of its TACR. Without airmobile assets the Brigade was restricted to the immediate vicinity of its base camps. When restricted to assault entirely by ground movement, the effectiveness was minimal since the VC units began to move around the US installations and effective ground range.
- f. Eagle flights were conducted infrequently because of the requirement to support US forces with artillery and the difficulty in moving and securing arty at temporary FSB's based on the dense jungles and lack of CH-47'S to accomplish timely movements.

Operations in War Zone C during this period were characterized by light contact with the exception of the Suci Cut Dattle. The VC/NTA personnel contacted during this period also second to be green and untrained as evidenced by several weapons captured that had never been fired and were relatively new. Also noted were random groups of VC/NVA personnel who were wentering about summingly disorganized and with a complete disregard for the use of cover and concealment. It is felt that all key personnel had displaced to the south and that the remaining strapplers were either replacements or rear-area type caretaker personnel.

Also noteworthy was a complete absence of newly emplaced mines or booby trees in the area of operations, all mines located were several menths old

and many had become uncovered by eresion.

Operations around the Day Tiong base comp and adjacent to the HSR from Dru Tiong to Try Ninh were characterized by an increase in herassient of the econy route and in an intensified mine and beeby trap effort in this area. It is felt that this harassient was coordinated to complement the Tot Offersive effort to conclise in achile units to the read not, to wester our forces by attrition at little cost to himself, and to restrict the deployment of personnel and equipment from Daw Tiong to support operations in the south. The best even eretien to the enemy's design is to continue and increase, if possible, the terms of offensive sweep operations in order to break out of regular patterns of dependence upon read networks.

Artillery support for 3-22 Infentry during Operation Yellowstone II was provided by 2-77 Artillery. At various times during the operation the following betteries provided direct support for the battalions

- (b) A Battery 2-77 Artillery (105mm) (c) B Buttery 2-77 Artillery (105cm)

(d) 1-27 Artillery (155mm)

(e) Additional fire support was provided by the Enttalion Heavy Maspons Flatoon in general susport, while all waspons platoons provided direct support at company loval. All supporting artillary fires were extranally responsive and accurate. b. United States Air Force: Extensive effective use was made of Tactical Air to include proplanned and immediate missions. All 3-22 Infantry requests for air support went through 3d Brigade, 25th Infantry Division, this was accomplished by forwarding all requests to the Brigade Idesion Officer.

c. Army Aviation:

- (2) Inily resupply and extraction sortion were flown by CH-47 holicopters. A severe rotor wash problem existed because of the powder condition of the soil at the FSB. This problem was partially solved by the use of Pena Prime on two helipads at the FSB.
- (3) On the morning of 2 Jan 68, during the Battle of Soul Out Army Aviation played a major role, At 0330 an emergency resupply of Class V was resupplied to 3-22 Infantry (-) by 165th Aviation, In addition 25th Aviation, 187th and 183th Combat Aviation Sattalions provided direct support with guaships and emergency resupply.
- (4) Buring Operation Yellowstone II, 3d Brigade Aviation Section provided OH-23's for the 3-22 Infantry on immediate and proplanted requests. Maximum extensive use was made of those resources for Recommenssance/Command Control of the nanouver elements.

S. (C) DIELIDENCE:

- a. Intelligence concerning the betteller TACR for Operation Yellowstone II was obtained from 25th Division G-2, 3d Brigade S-2, 25th II Detachment, VR sightings, and post operations.
- b. On the night of I Jamuary-2 January 1968, during the How Yours truce, FES BURT (X79080) was attacked by elements of the 271st and 272d VC Regiments. Interrogation of PO4s after the bettle revealed that on approximately 25 December these two Regiments moved from or through the Cambodian Solient to staging arons within several hours walking distarco of FSB MUNT. On the night prior to the attack, movement was engaged outside the perimeter and the following merning two bodies were discovered with documents indicating they belonged to the 271st (one body was possibly identified as the Company Commander of C.16 Morter Company, 271st Regiment). This was the first indication that this unit was in the area, The next night the 271st supported by at locat two Battalians of the 272d attacked FSB BUTT. It appeared that the bettle plan included four battaliens attacking with two battaliens in reserve. Documents found on one body indicated that he was the Commander of the 2d Bettalion, 271st Regiment, withough positive identification was impossible. A Hoi Chunh who rallied on 12 January 1968, stated he was a member of the 271st. His company had been held in reserve and at 020400 hours they began withdrawing into Cambodia. His unit later privod out of Cambodia to vicinity XT5191 whore they were hit by a 5/52 strike. They then newed back into Combodia (X75691).
- o. Buring the remaining period of Operation Yellowstone II, 3-22 Infantry experienced light energy contact. Intelligence reports during the later stages of Operation Yellowstone II indicated that the VC were plaining to conduct sujer offensive operations during the THT heliday period. It was assumed from those intelligence reports that the light contact we were experiencing was the result of the VC troop builder in without staging eross.

- 7. SUPPORTING PORCES: None
- 8. INTELLIGENCE:
- a. Prior to Operation. War Zone "C" is a historical enemy stronghold, it was known to have extensive base camps and large coches of amamition, weapons and food. Recent intelligence strongly indicated that COSYN headquarters, the combat elements in direct support of COSYN and at least one WC division were located in War Zone "C".
 - b. Terrain and Weather.
- (1) Generals The area of operation was bounded by the Cambodian border on the north, route TL22 on the west, the east/west grid KT63 on the south and the Saigon river on the east. The AO encompassed the entirety of War Zone "C".

- (2) Terrain: The area is flat to cently rolling with two prominent features: Nul he Den and the hill mass Hul The Le and Mul Ong. The terrain slopes from north to south, creating north/south patterns of movement, parellel to the stream flow. Asrial observation is very good in the open southern third of the area and poor in the creacent of jungle along the Cambrdian border. Ground observation is poor due to domes vegetation. Fields of fire in most areas are restricted by the vegetation.
- (3) Wester: The weather during operation EXLLOSTORE was typical of the dry season. The average temperature was 88 degrees and there was only one day of rain. In the norming hours, fog reduced the visibility, conditions improved at approximately 0930 and continued to improve throughout the day.
 - c. Intelligence During the Operation.

The area of operation contained important enemy base areas for logistical and command operations as well as a protected and commonated commo limited and supply corridor between War Zone "C" and Cambodia. Enemy units identified in the AC were 271st VC Regiment, 272d VC Regiment and 141st VC Regiment. The 1st Guard Battalian was also identified. During operation IELLOWSTONE numerous bunker complexes were discovered which could have supported the above units.

9. MISSIGH: Conduct operations in a signed areas in War Zone "C" with two air cavalry troops and one ground cavalry troop to find and fix the enemy; be prepared to secure route 4 from Tay Ninh to Eatum; secure Piro Support Base Soul De from enemy attack; secure downed aircraft and dropped loads anywhere in the area of operations.

10. Concept of Operation:

Hansuver - Operation will be conducted in two phases:

Phase II Movement to Sout Da

Phase II: 3-17th Cav will conduct recon in force with two air cavalry troops in assigned sones. Trp D provides base camp security. Squadron will be prepared to essist 1st Bde, 25th Inf Div in assigned AD to find and fix known enemy units. Maximum effort in initial phases. Maritad might recon will be conducted.

11. EXECUTION:

a. Hovement. On 7 December 1967 the squadron (minus C Trp) moved by organic ground and air vehicles from Di An to FSE Soui Da (ET340583). The Squadron Field Trains remained in Di An while the Combat Trains moved forward and co-located with the Squadron Command Post at FSE Soui Da. The move was completed by 071800H December 1967.

b. 8 Decamber 1967 thru 16 December 1967

Operations during this period were characterized by a day and night program of armed visual recommaissance with frequent insertions of the aerorifle platoons. D Trp conducted reconnaissance in force operations within AO Soud Da and convoy escort between Tay High and Soud Da. As enemy morter attacks increased in the vicinity of the FSU at Katum the squairon was tasked to perfore night counter-morter security for the FSB. This mission was happered by the lack of a secure landing area at or near the FSB. The squadron was forced to conduct the mission based out of FSB Soud Da which increased the resetire time by 15 minutes and reduced station time to 1 hour. Armed recommande sussions produced a constantly growing picture of the energy situation. It seem became evident that the initial intolligence estimate was correct. Sightings of previously unlocated base camps were reported daily. As each sub-area was searched in detail, large banker complexes were located along every large stream in the jungle area. Every lines of communication interlacing the fortified base camps were found and plotted, thills many of the base camps were wasant and should no signs of recent uso. A large percentage proved to be occupied and the acroscouts were drawing automatic weapons fire on every mission During those initial stages of the operation the squadron was averaging one sirerest hit per day. Upon locating an occupied base area all available fires were brought to beer on the target. Acrowapone immediately engaged the terget followed by TAS air and artillery adjusted by the aeroscoute. As a composite picture of the enemy location became clear, B-52 strikes were programmed on the larger consentrations. The squadron was soon requesting a B-32 strike a day with devestating results on the enemy. At 0445 hours on 14 December 1967, following nightly probes and harrassing fire, FSB Sout Da was attacked with small arms and RFG rockets. This resulted in 2 US WIA, two aircraft damaged and one destroyed. Fire was returned is ediately and a succe at first light revealed 1 WC KIA, 2 RPC rockets am. 1 RPG rocket leurober captured. Operations continued as normal with no reduction in combat effectiveness as a result of the attack. On 15 December 1967 while suppressing a norter attack on the FSB at Katum, a B Trp UMIC was downed by enough fire. The aircraft crashed in the jungle and 60 to 100 ft to s. An Olica of B Trp attempted to pickup the erow but was unable to make a safe approach to the area. A second OH6A with a lighter fuel and ammunition load succeeded in reaching the downed gunships. While extracting two crowssubers, the OHOA was also downed by onemy fire. The surviving crownembers formed a perimeter of defense and with the support of acroscapone ships were able to hold off the energy until a friendly ground force readhed them and extracted them. US lesses were 2 KIA. The following morning, B Trp aeroscouts and aeroweapons escorted elements of the 2d Bm, 14th Inf into the area to secure the aircreft for extraction. The scoute, proceding the infantry, counted 50 Wo bodies. On 16 December 1967, C Trp, which had been OFCOW to the 199th LIB, reverted to aquadren control and A Trp was released to the OFCOW of the 199th LIB. This change-over was conducted while continuing to accomplish both essigned adeadons.

- c. 17 December 1967. C Trp sererifles were inserted at XT577375, to perform a Bomb Damage Assessment following a B-52 Strike. During the recommendates area, energy contact was made resulting in 1 MVA PC. 3 MVA NOA. 2 AK A7 and two 9mm platels captured. Asserted medical supplies and web gear were also evacuated. Informognation of the PCW revealed that he was a member of a previously unidentified buttalion which had just entered South Vietnam and had not yet been committed. Based on this and other intelligence the 25th Inf Div initiated operation CAMDES with one Brigade.
- d. 18 Secember 1997 thre 1 January 1968. The squadren contimmed its primary mission of armed visual reconnaissance; hevever, several major modifications were made in both the mission assignment and the squadron's mode of operation. It was realized that portions of the initial mission were detrimental to the overall effectiveness of the squadron; for example, in order to secure downed aircraft and dropped loads, it is necessary to provide continuous sorial coverage and, in most cases, insert an aerorifle platoon for ground security. To accomplish the mission the squadron is required to divert at least one air cavalry troop from their primary m'asion of recommissance, thus greatly reducing the effectiveness of the squadron in its primary role. In some cases, when dropped lowis were in incluted areas, an air cavalry troop would be diverted for a day at a time. When this was fully realthe 25th laf Div released the squadron from that portion of the original mission statement. At that time it was also realized that the areas of aperation assigned the squedron were too restrictive and that the squadron's capabilities were not being taken advantage of. It was decided that, rather than assign areas of operation, the squadren should have a free reign throughout the division TACR. This was accomplished by placing a lisiace team with each brigado command post to coordinate activities within the brigade's area of responsibility. This close coordination allowed a more rapid dissemination of information and the brigades were able to react directly to information collected by the acroscouts. Within a short time, joint operations with aeroscouts and sererifies closents leading the infantry units into proviously located encay areas and with acrowcepons supporting became common place. As the units became accustomed to working together and the ground elements gained confidence in the credibility of the intelligence furnished by the serescents and the securacy of the fires of the serescences, a smooth and efficient team came into existence. This greatly increased morale as well as the efficiency of both clements. The air cavalry clements became more enthused as they saw tangible results being produced from the reconnecissance they had performed. For the ground elements, prior knowledge of what to expect and pinpoint location of the energy load to a number of successes. Large caches were located and either destroyed or evacuated. The enemy will not be capable of rostocking the rice, weapons and amounition lost in those sweeps for a considerable length of time.



 1 January 1968 thru 6 January 1968. At 2400 hrs 1 January 1968, the enemy broke the New Years truce by a multi-regimental attack on FSB Burt, ITA99800. Acrowspons teams were immediately dispatched to help relieve the besieged infantry and artillery. As the amunition supply of the defenders grow short, it was decided that an aerial re-supply and reinforcement must be attempted. To accomplish this, the 25th Inf Div pooled the lift absets of the 25th Avn Bdo, D Trp of 3/4 Cav and B & C Trps of the 3/17th Cav under the command of the C Trp Commander. The provisional airlift company noved to the FSB at Ketun to swait further designs. An aurial re-supply of PSB Burt was accomplished and the promisional company was released to the parent units upon arrival of elements of the 269th Combat Aviation Dattalion. B & C Trp continued saturetien recommissance of the area surrounding FOS Burt. Howevent was detected along two main routes of withdrawal and fire was brought to bear on the retresting energy. The secuts and weapons continued to engage the energ until darkness afforded him a means of escape. At the and of the day the aquidron had accounted for 26 WC KLA (BC). Since most of the engagement was in dense jungle it is reasonable to assume that the actual number was many times the body count, At 022058 Jan 68 the enemy regen a north attack on FSB Soul Da, a total of 11 rounds fell with me friendly leures. At dawn 3 Jan 68, the serescents picked up the trail of the relevanting WD and continued the actions of the preceding day. The northern escape route was traced to a regimental base comp complex in a dense fungle, vic 17556910, 17561910, 17555905 and 17561905. Apparently the WC had thought this area eafo from detection and had planned as regroup and re-supply there. Munerous air strikes were directed into the base camps throughout the day. The artillery provided continuous fires between air strikes and throughout the night. Resuming operations at first light on 4 Jan 68, a definite pattern of novement north towards Cambodia was detected. Automatic weapons fire firected at the aeroscouts continued to be heavy as in the past three days. Here again the pattern was definitely shifting north, On the 5th of January, groups of WC were detected noving north on the trails carrying wounded. . group of 11 W were caught in the open at 17542902 and killed by acrowagens claments. One of the 11 was a messenger carrying a pouch of documents. A platoon from the 4th Rn, 9th Inf was inserted to recover the pouch but came under heavy automatic weapon fire. The aeroweapons covered the extraction of the plateen. It was certain by this time that the remements of the attacking force were fleeing north and into Cambodia, Aeroweapons ships at high altitude were able to detect 3 battalion sixed base campe and numerous smaller camps inside Cambodia in the "Fish Hook" area. One of these camps overlapped the border and a B-52 strike was placed at IT535907. A ground insertion at IT533901 was attempted to follow up the strike but the enery had not been workened enough to allow the exploitation to be successful. The serorifles were pinned down by automatic weapons fire from bankers surrounding the landing some. The lift returned and under the cover of the asrowcapone plateen fires successfully extracted the sergrifles. The coordination of fires and team work enabled the associates to be extracted with minimum friendly losses. One Util was destroyed by ground fire, however the crew suffered only minor injuries.

The second element maintained full operational capabilities while the first displaced. The entire operation went smoothly and the support of the combat elements continued..

g. 8 Jammry 1968 thru 30 January 1968. The aquadron continued to operate in the manner described in para d. With the release from the mission of securing FSB Soud Da, more of the combat power of the squadron became available. D Trp was able to conduct more extensive operations and began to conduct troop sized recommissance in force daily. C Trp, in coordination with the 3d Bde, inserted the care-rifle plateon on a daily basis. The securifles would be inserted in blocking positions for the 2d Bm, 22d Mach. After the units converged the deverifles would act as a point element leading the ground force into beauty bases under the direction of the seroscouts. On 24 January D Trp was released to the operational control of the let Bde and OCCC was further delegated to the let Bm, 5th Mach.

h. 31 January 1968 thru 24 February 1968. The squadron was diversed from operation MELLOWSTONE to operation SERITOGI.

14. SPECIAL EQUIPMENT AND EXCHNIQUES:

The need for an organic aircraft nounted night-lighting device was realized during the operation. The Squadren's ability to perform its mission at night is limited at this time. 



This method, called "Baby Sitting" by the aeroscoute, has increased the officiency of the aeroscoute by assuring them inmediate support if downed by ground fire.

7. (C) SUPPORTING FORCES:

A. ARTILLERY:

PREPLANNED AND OB CALL DIRECT AND INDIRECT ART-ILLERY FIRES WERE USED DURING THE OPERATION TO COVER ENEMY ROUTES OF ADVANCE AND WITHDRAWAL. ARTILLERY WAS ALWAYS AVAILABLE AND WAS CONSIDERED EXTREMELY EFFECTIVE AND TIMELY. THE USE OF DIRECT FIRE ARTILLERY, 105MM HE AND BEEHIVE AND 155MM HE, PROVED TO BE PARTIC-ULARLY EFFECTIVE IN HOLDING ENEWY ASSAULTS AT THE FSB PERIMETER. ARTILLERY FIRE WAS INITIALLY USED DURING THE EMRLY STAGES OF THE ATTACK PRIMARILY IN A COUNTER-MORTAR ROLE. PREPLANNED COUNTER-MORTAR TARGETS WERE ATTACKED BY ALL FIRING BATTERIES LOCATED AT PREPLANNED COUNTER-FSB BURT AND FSB BEAUREDARD. AS THE ATTACK PROGRESSED AND LISTEN-ING POSTS AND AMBUSH PATROLS LOCATED OUTSIDE THE PERIMETER REPORTED CONTACT WITH ENEMY FORCES, CALLS FOR INDIRECT FIRE WERE RECEIVED AND DELIVERED BY THE ARTILLERY. AS IT BECAME FYIDENT THAT A FULL SCALE ENEMY ATTACK WAS IN PROGRESS, MUMEROUS CALLS FOR FIRE WERE RECEIVED. ADJUST FIRE AND PREPEAMNED DEFENSIVE CONCENTRATIONS WERE FIRED. AT ONE POINT, THE BATTERY FIRE DIRECTION CENTER OF BATTERY C.

20 BN, 77TH ARTY REPORTED HANDLING 8 MISSIONS SIMULTANEOUSLY. PERHAPS THE MOST EFFECTIVE USE OF ARTILLERY WAS MADE IN A DIRECT FIRE
ROLE. AS THE PERIMETER REPORTED HEAVY CONTACT, THE ARTILLERY MEN
LEVELED THEIR TUBES AND, AFTER COCRDINATION WITH INFAMTRY ELEMENTS,
BEGAN DELIVERING HE DIRECT FIRE INTO LOCATIONS JUST FORWARD OF THE
PERIMETER. A LARGE VOLUME OF DIRECT FIRE WAS DELIVERED AROUND THE
ENTRIPS PERIMETER DURING THE BATTLE. HIGHLY INSTRUMENTA, IN STOPPING ENEMY FORCES ATTEMPTING TO BREACH THE PERIMETER WAS THE USE OF

CONTACT WITH THESE ELEMENTS BY THE 1ST BRIGADE, 25TH INFANTRY US DIVISION ON 16 AND 20 DECEMBER IN THE VICINITY OF KATUM AND BO TUC CONFIRMED THE PRESENCE OF THIS UNIT. IN ADDITION, ELEMENTS OF THE 271ST VC REGIMENT WERE ALSO BELIEVED TO BE LOCATED IN THE VICINITY OF XT3976.

IT IS QUITE OBVIOUS THAT THE ENEMY PLANNED TO USE THE CEASE FIRE TO MOVE HIS TROOPS SAFELY TO WITHIN STRIKING RANGE OF THE FSB.
- (3) READOUTS OF CAPTURED ENEMY DOCUMENTS AND INTEROGATION OF PW'S INDICATE THAT THE ENTIRE 271ST VC REGIMENT / 1D
 THE 5TH AND 6TH BATTAKIONS, 272D VC REGIMENT WERE EMPLOYED IN
 THIS ATTACK.
- (4) THE ATTACK OF FSB BURT TOOK THE FORM OF WHAT APPEARED TO BE HARASSING MORTAR FIRE INTO THE FSB DURING EARLY EVENING HOURS. AS THE EVENING PROGRESSED, AMBUSH PATROLS BEGAN OBSERVING INCREASING MOVEMENT AT VARIOUS POINTS COMPLETELY ENGIRED INTO THE PERIMETER OF THE FSB. AT APPROXIMATELY 2100-2200 HOURS, AMBUSH PATROLS BEGAN RECEIVING "PROBING ATTACKS" WHICH DEVELOPED INTO HEAVY CONTACT BY SMALL ENEMY ELEMENTS. 15. (C) COMMANDERS ENALYSIS: NVA FORCES ENCOUNTERED DURING THIS ENGAGEMENT APPEARED TO BE WELL DISCIPLINED AND WERE VERY WELL EQUIPPED, INCLUDING NEW WEAPONS. THE SUCCESS OF THE DEFENSE IS
ATTRIBUTED TO THE DETERMINATION OF THE INDIVIDUAL SOLDIER, SUPERIOR

16. (C) RECOMMENDATIONS:

- ENSE OF A FSB IS A PRIMARY CONSIDERATION. PLANNING OF PERIMETER INSTALLATIONS MUST INCLUDE OVERHEAD AND REAR PROTECTION TO PERMIT ITS UNINHIBITED EMPLOYMENT.
- TO ENEMY COURSES OF ACTION. AP'S SHOULD BE CONSTITUTED IN SUFFICIENT STRENGTH. TO PROTECT THEMSELVES, BUT NOT SO LARGE AS TO BE UNABLE TO
