1. In accordance with VOCO, the undersigned conducted an informal investigation to determine the facts and circumstances surrounding the explosion in the Bravo Company ASP which caused the fire on & February 1968.

2. Eravo Company had established an ASF for the Tay Ninh Base Camp ready reaction force which was organized from the rear area personnel of the Battalion. A second ASF was established upon arrival of the convoy at 1830 hours. This ASF contained a portion of the Company amaunition that was on position at Katum and could not be carried back on the airmobile move.

3. At 2005 hours, reports were received that the Battalion was receiving incoming modear rounds. The bunker line OD report reflects an entry at the time specified bunkers 44-47 were receiving mortar rounds in and around their area. These bunkers are located to the N' of the Battalion area on the perimeter. The brigade journal reflects an entry (w/C) that "the 2/14 reports a fire in the SM ASM. Fire was started by incoming S/A and 60mm Mortar ads. The rounds came from the MN<sup>\*</sup>.

4. The statement by CPT Montgomery states he heard what he believed to be incoming rounds. Although not in the immediate area of the ASF, the undersigned and MAJ Stoy (Ede S-1) concur in the position that we heard small arms fire and explosions that sounded like incoming mortar rounds prior to hearing the amnunition blocking up.

5. A search of the debris the following day uncovered one 82mm Mortar fin which I am retaining in my possession.

6. Conclusion. The ammunition was destroyed by enemy initiated activity.
